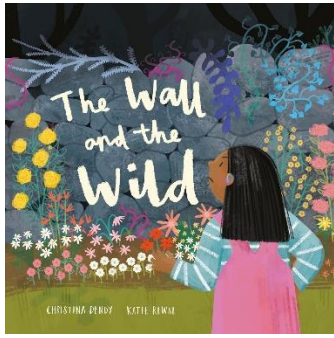
## The Reading World Cup!

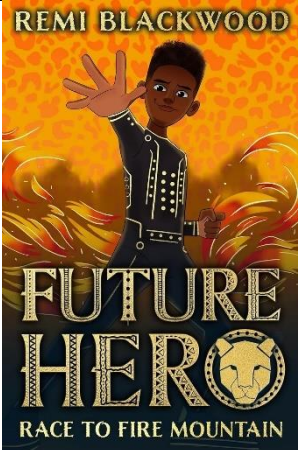


## **The Wall and the Wild** by Christina Dendy Recommended for Reception, Year 1 and Year 2



This book first grabbed me with its language and vocabulary – ‘constellations of leaves’... what an image! But this book is also a fantastic learning and discussion point for climate change and biodiversity!

Ana grows only perfectly-sized plants and flowers, and throws everything else over the wall into the Wild. But as her garden gets neater, the Wild begins to grow...

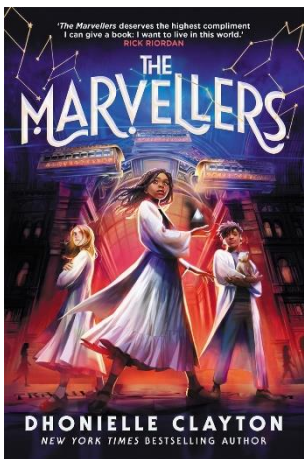


## **Race to Fire Mountain** by Remi Blackwood Recommended for Years 3 and 4



Another language-rich book for Years 3 and 4, but told in accessible short chapters! This is the first of the 4-book Future Hero series and has completely swept up a storm!

When Jarell discovers that the fantasy world he is obsessed with doodling is actually real, he is launched into an incredible adventure. Ulfrika, the land of his ancestors, is in trouble and he is the hero they need. With the help of brave and wise-cracking Kimisi, Jarell must stop the evil Ikala. The future of Ulfrika depends on it...



## **The Marvellers** by Dhonielle Clayton Recommended for Years 5 and 6

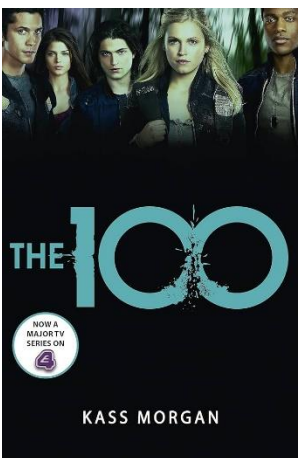


First of all – this is nothing to do with Marvel...

This is a book that is so easy to fall in love with – the word and the characters are so rich and vivid that it absolutely deserves the celebration it has received since last year.

Ella attends a magic school for Marvellers from around the world. She finds friendship in fellow misfits Brigit, a girl who hates magic, and Jason, a boy with a fondness for magical creatures and support from her Elixirs teacher, Masterji Thakur.

When the notorious Ace of Anarchy escapes prison and Masterji Thakur mysteriously disappears, Ella finds herself as the prime suspect...



## **The 100** by Kass Morgan Recommended for grown-ups



This is a series that can absolutely capture you... It's described as 'The Hunger Games meets Lost', and that is spot on!

After a devastating nuclear war, humans have lived on spaceships far above the Earth's radioactive surface. Now, 100 juvenile delinquents are being sent on a dangerous mission to recolonise the planet. Among them are Clarke, Wells (the Chancellor's son) and reckless Bellamy – never meant to be heroes, but they could be mankind's last hope. Confronted with a savage land and haunted by secrets from their pasts, the hundred must fight to survive.
