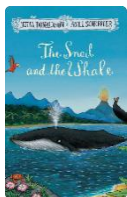

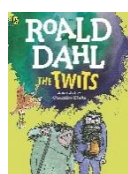

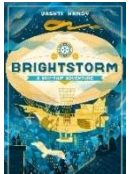

### MR WOLF'S PANCAKES

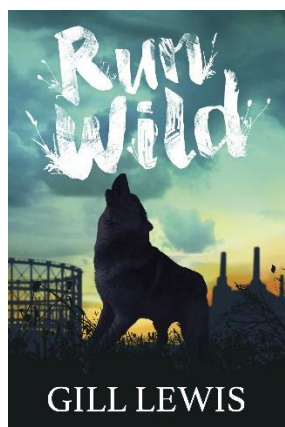


### 'Mr Wolf's Pancakes' by Jan Fearnley

Recommended for Reception, Year 1 and Year 2

Perfect for a shared or independent read, this picture book is full of fun and humour, as Mr Wolf gets into lots of trouble making pancakes.

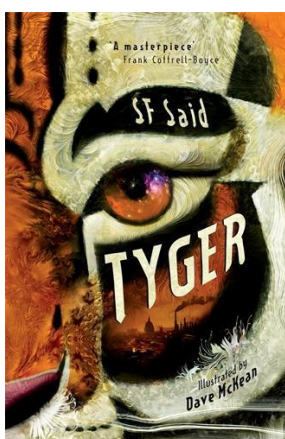


### 'Run Wild' by Gill Lewis

Recommended for Years 3 and 4

This was actually recommended to me by a friend last term, and I could not agree more. This is a beautifully written tale of friendship and freedom that celebrates nature in such a powerful way.

Izzy, Connor and Asha ignore the 'Danger' signs posted around the derelict gasworks, where they discover a hidden urban wilderness... and an injured wolf. Visiting 'Wolf Land' every day, they enjoy their newfound freedom, until other visitors begin to discover their secret and their new world is torn apart.

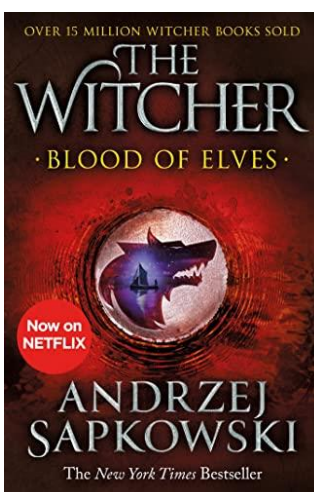


### 'Tyger' by S.F. Said

Recommended for Years 5 and 6

I am a massive fan of S.F. Said, having written two of my favourites – 'Varjak Paw' and 'Phoenix', and his new book absolutely doesn't disappoint.

This is a dark, mythical and magical story set in an alternative London, where the British Empire still rules and slavery is very much present. *Tyger* follows the challenging lives of two children, Adam and Zadie. Adam's life changes the day he stumbles across the helpless 'tyger' in the city's rubbish dump. As Adam and Zadie try to help the creature, they realise it isn't just the tyger's life at stake, but their whole world is on the verge of destruction.



### 'The Witcher: Blood of Elves' by Andrew Sapkowski

Recommended for grown-ups

As a favourite genre of mine, I was surprisingly late to 'The Witcher' party. Following the advice from my brother-in-law, I decided to pick up the book, and could not put it down!

Inspired by the video game and now a Netflix series, we join Ciri - granddaughter of Queen Calanthe – at the massacre of Cintra. It appears that the peace between humans, dwarves, gnomes and elves is over as the threat of war hangs and Ciri is hunted for her powers. Upon learning of the birth of Ciri – the prophesised child with the power to change the world for good or evil – it becomes the responsibility of the Witcher, Geralt of Rivia, to protect her.
