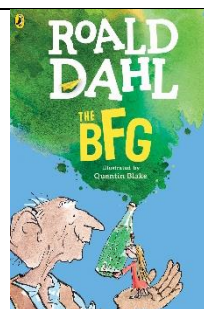

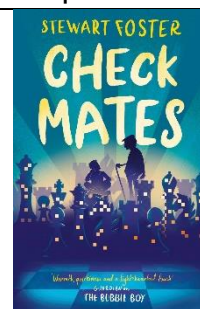

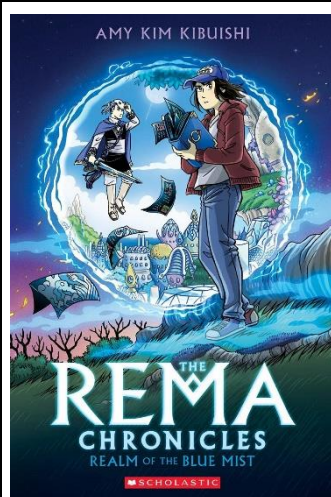

The Rema Chronicles: Realm of the Blue Mist

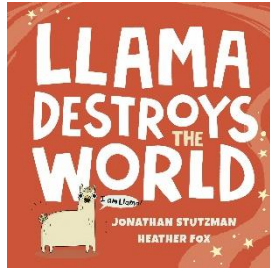

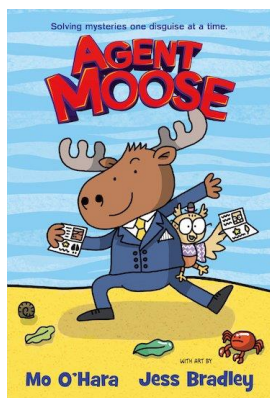
Book Suggestions

Recommended for Reception, Years 1 and 2

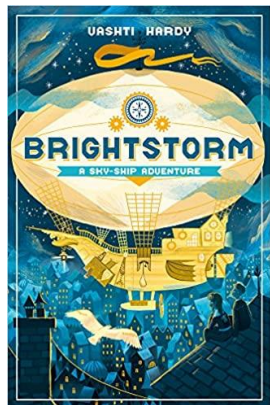

'Agent Moose' by Mo O'Hara

Recommended for Years 3 and 4

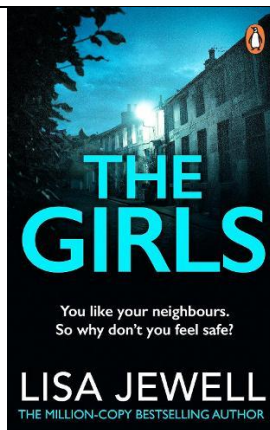
The best way to describe Agent Moose is the James Bond of the animal kingdom! The only difference being Agent Moose requires his sidekick Owlfred to help him considerably more than Bond does! Agent Moose and Owlfred are set on the hunt for a missing turtle, but along the way they discover missing witnesses and something fishy happening at Secret Agent HQ. Could the culprit be closer to home than they think? With Moose more interested in his elaborate disguises and Owlfred more concerned about not being eaten by Barry the Barracuda, will the case of the disappearing animals ever be solved?



'Brightstorm' by Vashti Hardy

Recommended for Years 5 and 6

Twin siblings, Arthur and Maudie, are searching for answers about their missing father (a famous explorer who went down with his airship under mysterious conditions). He has been accused of stealing fuel before he died. However, the twins do not believe the news, and they answer an ad to join a new attempt to reach South Polaris. It's their only hope of learning the truth ... will they find the answers they seek? A fabulously written story with adventure, mystery and intrigue. Vashti Hardy's imagination is, quite simply, magical. There is a familiarity in the world her characters inhabit, yet at the same time something entirely new. Ships? Yes, but sky-ships. Wolves? Yes, but thought-wolves. There is a sequel to this story available, called 'Darkwhispers' which is equally as gripping and certainly does not disappoint!



'The Girls' by Lisa Jewell

Recommended for grown-ups!

You live on a picturesque communal garden square, an oasis in urban London where your children run free, in and out of other people's houses. You've known your neighbours for years and you trust them. Implicitly. You think your children are safe. But are they really? Midsummer night: a thirteen-year-old girl is found unconscious in a dark corner of the garden square. What really happened to her? And who is responsible?
