We have 10 signed copies on their way to us and can't wait to read them. Class 3 have had a sneaky peak at the first chapters...

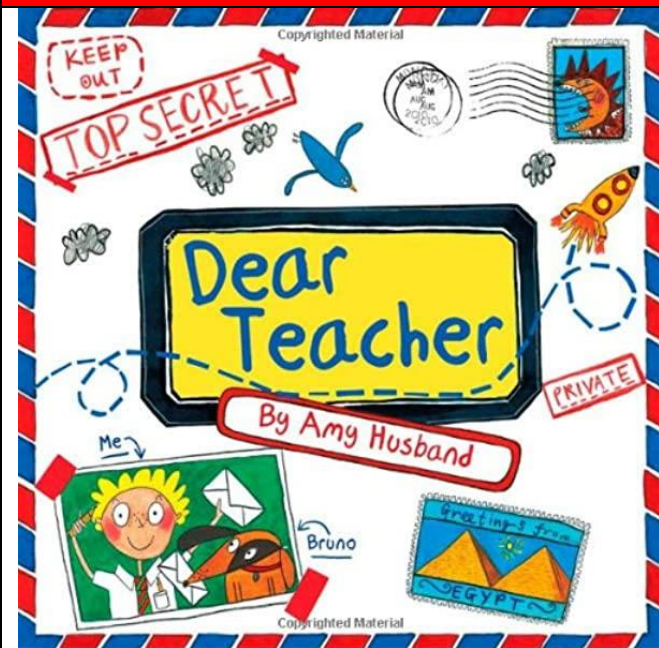

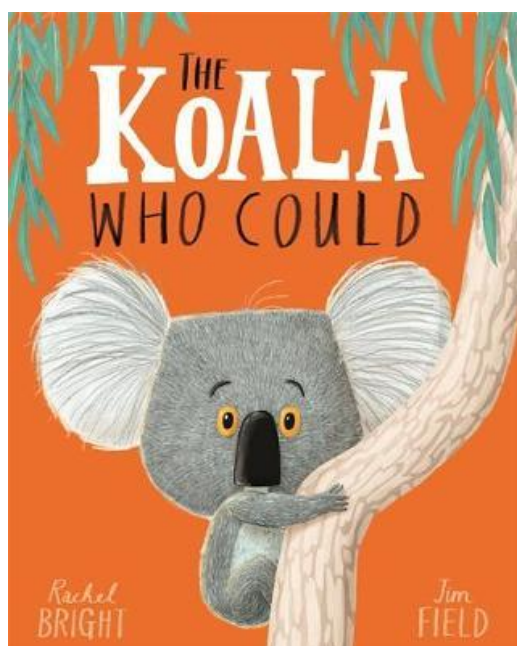
A warm and affectionate look at the joys and difficulties of making and keeping friends and finding your place in the world.

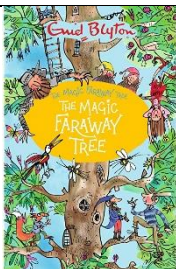

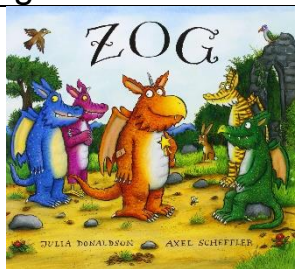

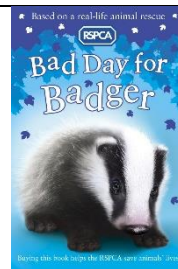
Our children have been developing a wonderful reading repertoire! We asked which books they would recommend and here are just a few of the books that have really grabbed them.



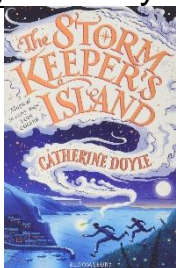

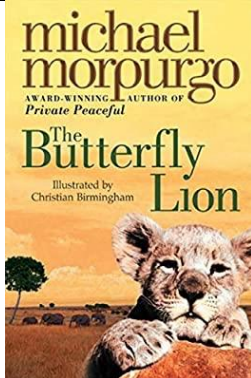


'The Bear and the Piano' by David Litchfield

Aimed at Class 1.

One day, a young bear stumbles upon something he has never seen before in the forest. As time passes, he teaches himself how to play the strange instrument, and eventually the beautiful sounds are heard by a father and son who are picnicking in the woods. The bear goes with them on an incredible journey to New York, where his piano playing makes him a huge star. He has fame, fortune and all the music in the world, but he misses the friends and family he has left behind.

A moving tale of exploration and belonging from an exciting debut author-illustrator.

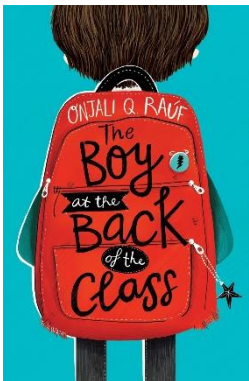


'The Butterfly Lion' by Michael Morpurgo

Aimed at Class 2.

Bertie swears that one day they will see one another again, but it is the butterfly lion which ensures that their friendship will never be forgotten.

'The Boy at the Back of the Class' by Onjali Rauf

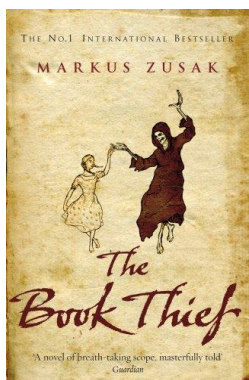
Aimed at Class 3.

'The Book Thief' by Markus Zusak

Aimed at grown-ups!

It is 1939. In Nazi Germany, the country is holding its breath.

Death has never been busier - and will become busier still.

By her brother's graveside, Liesel's life is changed forever when she picks up a single object, abandoned in the snow. It is The Gravedigger's Handbook, and this is her first act of book thievery. So begins Liesel's love affair with books and words, and soon she is stealing from Nazi book-burnings, the mayor's wife's library . . . wherever there are books to be found.

But these are dangerous times, and when Liesel's foster family hides a Jew in their basement, nothing will ever be the same again.

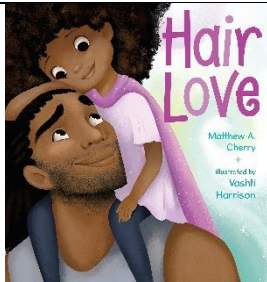
In superbly crafted writing that burns with intensity, award-winning author Markus Zusak has given us one of the most enduring stories of our time.

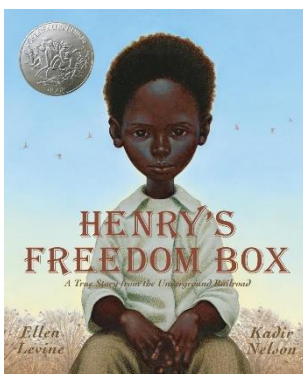
'Hair Love' by Matthew Cherry

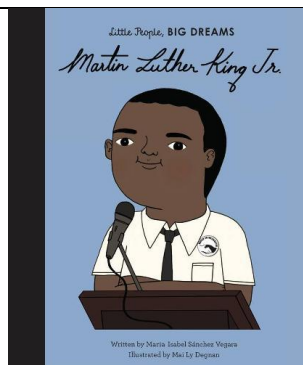
'Young, Gifted and Black' by Jamia Wilson

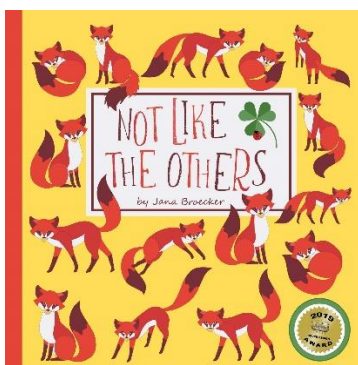
'Henry's Freedom Box' by Ellen Levine

After an arduous journey in the crate, Henry finally has a birthday – and his first day of freedom!



'Martin Luther King, Jr. - Little People, Big Dreams' by Maria Isabel Sanchez Vegara

Inspire the next generation of outstanding people who will change the world! This moving book features stylish and quirky illustrations, where you can discover the life of Martin Luther King, Jr., the inspiring minister and civil rights activist.



'Not Like the Others' by Jana Broecker

This book about diversity promotes acceptance, understanding and kindness for all by showcasing that each of us, irrespective of our own unique qualities, is an essential part of a bigger picture. Which fox has the fluffiest tail? Where is the squirrely that holds an acorn? Over 250 forest animals fill the pages of this beautifully illustrated book. Little eyes will be eager to spot the one animal that is *Not Like the Others*, little ears will cherish the rhymes, and little minds will learn that it's our differences that make us special.

The Importance of Reading for Pleasure

There is overwhelming evidence that Literacy has a significant relationship to people's life chances. Reading for pleasure is more important than either wealth or social class as an indicator of success at school and beyond.

If your child isn't a book worm yet, don't worry! There are so many wonderful and exciting authors – there's a book to catch you out there, you just may not have discovered it yet!

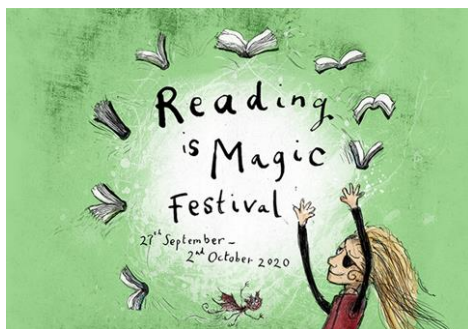


Rotary Young Writer Competition
