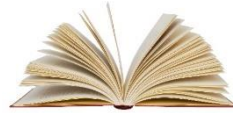

Hi Redmile Primary School,

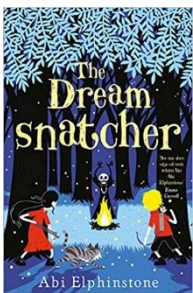
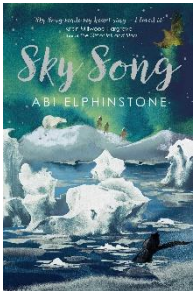
Happy New Year! As we begin a new decade, I just wanted to send you a little message on why I think reading matters...

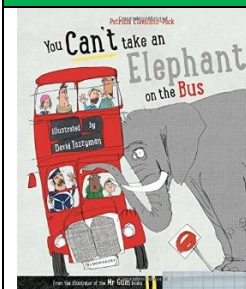

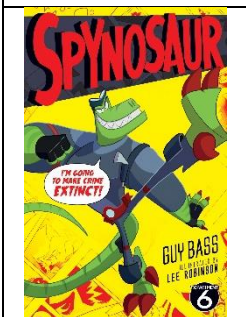

Aimed at Reception.

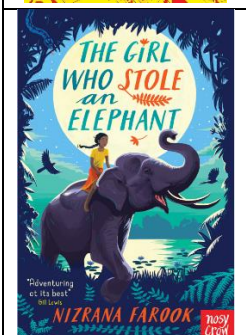

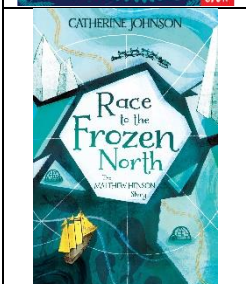


‘The Girl Who Stole an Elephant’ by Nizzrana Farook

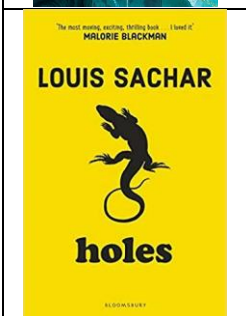
Will stealing the queen's jewels be the beginning or the end of everything for the intrepid gang?

Aimed at Class 2/3.

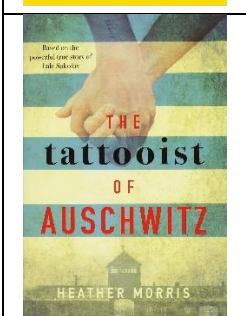

‘Holes’ by Louis Sachar

Aimed at Class 3.

Stanley Yelnats' family has a history of bad luck, so he isn't too surprised when a miscarriage of justice sends him to a boys' juvenile detention centre. At Camp Green Lake (which isn't green and doesn't have a lake), the boys must dig a hole every day: five feet deep and five feet across in the dried-up lake bed. The Warden claims the labour is character building, but it is a lie. Stanley must dig up the truth.



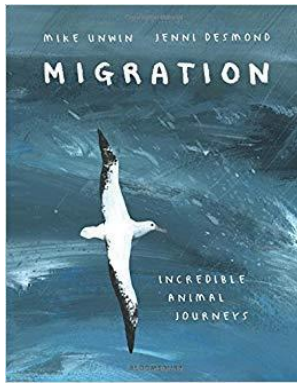
‘The Tattooist of Auschwitz’ by Heather Morris

Aimed at grown-ups!

Lale Sokolov's job was to tattoo every new inmate as they enter the infamous concentration camp – Auschwitz, arguably one of the most recognisable symbols of the Holocaust. Imprisoned for more than two and a half years, Lale witnesses horrific atrocities and barbarism—but also incredible acts of bravery and compassion. Risking his own life, he uses his privileged position to exchange jewels and money from murdered Jews for food to keep his fellow prisoners alive.

Migration: Incredible Animal Journeys by Mike Unwin

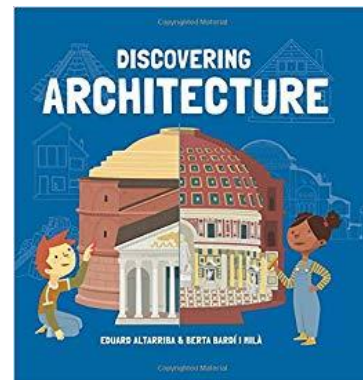

Who built the first houses? What's the difference between an arch and an architrave? How does a dome stay up? Who invented concrete? Can you build a house from paper?

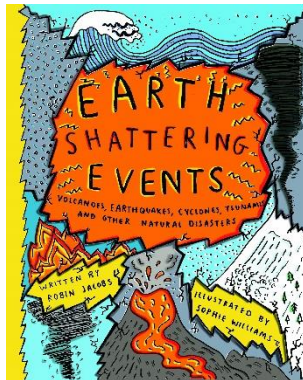

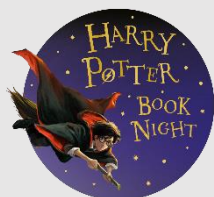
National Storytelling Week

The theme for Harry Potter Book Night 2020 is the Tri-wizard Tournament.

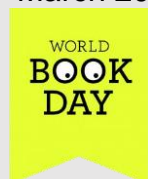
Wizards, witches and Muggles from around the world are invited to take part in a tournament of their own, competing in enchanting games, making magical crafts and testing their skills with an array of activities.
