Book Suggestions




The Three Little Wolves and the Big Bad Pig by Eugene Trivizas

Recommended for Reception, Year 1 and Year 2

We love a twist on a traditional tale, and this twist on 'The Three Little Pigs' is one of my all-time favourites. In this hilarious new version of the story, the three little wolves build houses of bricks, concrete and steel in an attempt to escape the Big Bad Pig, who is well armed with a tool kit including a sledgehammer and a pneumatic drill.

This is one of my daily bedtime reads with Bella at home, so I hope you find just as much enjoyment as we do!




The Wonder Brothers by Frank Cottrell-Boyce

Recommended for Years 3 and 4

An author that I'd generally recommend for our older readers, but it would be unfair to hide this book from Class 2!

Cousins Middy and Nathan are obsessed with magic. Not the kind with wands and spells, but real stage magic, with capes, tricks, and disappearing acts. When Blackpool Tower vanishes during the Big Switch-On, Nathan promises (on live TV!) that they'll bring it back—with magic!

With just a sparkly cape and a stick of rock, they suddenly find themselves in Las Vegas, where the world's greatest magician, Perplexion, performs. But Vegas is full of secrets, and in a city where nothing is what it seems, Middy and Nathan are in for their biggest trick yet...




When the Sky Falls by Phil Earle

Recommended for Years 5 and 6

This was a recent find of mine, and I know the Year 5s and 6s have been captivated by stories set in the wars.

It follows Joseph, a boy living in the city during the Blitz, where he's placed with the stern Mrs. F, who owns a rundown zoo. There, he forms a deep and unexpected bond with Adonis, a silverback gorilla whose strength is matched only by his gentleness. The relationship between boy and beast is powerful, tender, and filled with tension—especially as the threat of bombs grows closer. Based on a true story, it's a beautifully written tale about trust, resilience, and the unlikely friendships that carry us through the darkest times.



A Court of Thorns and Roses by Sarah J Mass

Recommended for grown-ups!

A new genre for me – 'Romantasy' - but I am absolutely hooked! Having absolutely devoured the 5-book series over the past month, I'm now working my way through a whole new realm of fantasy authors...

A Court of Thorns and Roses ('ACOTAR') tells the story of 19-year-old Feyre, a mortal girl trying to keep herself and her sisters alive. After being captured for killing a faerie disguised as a wolf, she is taken to the faerie realm of Prythian. Her captor, Tamlin – High Lord of the Spring Court, initially seems a beast, but their relationship gradually shifts from hostility as Feyre adapts to her new life. However, a growing dark force threatens Prythian, and Feyre must find a way to stop it by potentially dooming Tamlin and his world.

At a glance, I'd summarise as Beauty and the Beast meets the Hunger Games. However, as the plot unfolds, it becomes so much bigger than that...
